For me the tragedy is that this was predictable especially from 1912 forwards with the importation of arms through Larne and Howth, the decision by the British government to divide the country on a sectarian headcount before a shot was fired, the Conservative Party and others ratcheting up the confrontation with the British Parliament, the failure to face down the Curragh Mutiny by the British Army. The Home Rule Bill could not be stomached in Ireland by some people and in reality it was no more than glorified county council status. The tragedy after the Rising was to cede political control to Sir John Maxwell and the military. Everything is political and again the British Government lost or gave away control and it's responsibilities.

How do we contain this imaginative power? In part by shifting back to facts ... however, facts will not be enough. We have to accept that the Rising will always be imaginatively powerful and ... that it can always be reimagined. The imaginative space that the Rising opens up can accommodate too the idea that the rebels themselves imagined: a real republic of equal citizens.

Do we necessarily want to contain the Rising's imaginative power, though, rather than inhabit it? Strange that, after such a generous and inclusive look at the history of the idea of the Rising, should bemoan the inability of facts to quench it.

Or is he meaning that the emerging facts reduce the negative power and attraction of 'armed propoganda' and allow the imaginative space to be filled with the people and ideas excluded by that narrowness, allowing us to feed the Rising into our own re-imagining and perhaps even enabling of 'a real republic of equal citizens'? In which case, bring it on!







The aim of 1916 Sackville Street Art Project (now known as O'Connell Street, Dublin) is to hold an exhibition of houses in any 3D art form commemorating the lives of the ordinary civilians that were killed in the 1916 Easter Rising. 485 people were killed in the Easter Rising 1916, 262 of these were civilians. The objective of the Art Project is to tell their story by constructing 262 3D art form houses representing each of the civilians killed.



About 18 months ago I published, in vol. 14, No.3, of the Dublin Historical Record, a plea for the saving of Kilmainham Jail from the inevitable destruction which must take place if nothing is done to arrest the deterioration of the structure which goes on daily. In no other building has so much of our national history been enacted and as a civic and national memorial it would not redound to our credit were it allowed to disappear. My hope was that others would take up this project of its restoration but although a large body of sentiment favourable to the project disclosed itself no one has come forward to take the initial steps.

With that end in view I propose the convening of a meeting to consider what can be done and have invited Mr. Sean Dowling, B.D.S. 68 Lr. The Easter Rising continues to be the subject of popular and academic publications, with recent research often focusing on aspects of social and cultural history, such as the role of women in the Rebellion.


